A message from the Chair

We reported on the Parish Council Website the outcome of the latest court date, in relation to the Memorial Park, a summary is given below.

Merren Jones, Stephen Covey Crump -V- Chapel en-le-Frith - Council

Following one and a half days of preliminary legal argument the case has been adjourned so that the Council can make an application to the High Court on a point of law. The case cannot continue until the High Court has made that ruling.

Sharing information has to be balanced against the risk of prejudicing the continuing proceedings. So, we will take advice on what can be shared, if it is already in the public domain

I want to ensure that more people are aware of what is happening with the Parish Council and in the local community. This newsletter is part of the way we are improving communication. Pension Credit Advice Surgery

We recently held a really successful information event for local people in the Town Hall annexe in partnership with High Peak Borough Councillor, Sally Depee. There were around 20 attendees, who told us what a difference the advice surgery had made to them.

One person discovered - during their discussion with Front Line Debt, they

are potentially eligible for an additional £5k per annum. This will be followed up with a claim

Pension Credit – what it is, who is eligible and how to apply

Pension credit is a weekly benefit to boost the income of people over retirement age and it is based on how much money you have coming in. It is a benefit that acts as a 'passport' to other benefits – such as Housing Benefit, Council Tax Reduction, free Television licenses if you are over 75 and from this year the Winter Fuel Payment. Because of this it's worth applying for Pension Credit even if you don't think you'll get much.

Who is eligible?

To claim Pension Credit you must:

- 1. have reached State Pension age
- 2. not have too much income or savings
- 3. live in the UK

If you already get a disability benefit such as Disability Living Allowance or Attendance Allowance you will get additional amounts added to the amount you are entitled to receive, and if you are the carer for someone else there is an additional amount for that too.

If you qualify for Pension Credit, you'll still get a Winter Fuel Payment if you apply for Pension Credit by 21 December – you can backdate your claim to 16 to 22 September, which is the qualifying date for Winter fuel payments. There are also other benefits such as Income Support, Working Tax Credit and Universal Credit which will also allow you to quality for the Winter Fuel Allowance. In addition financial support is available such as the Household Support Fund.

You can contact CAB directly if you prefer and they can carry out a benefit check to confirm your entitlement to Winter Fuel Allowance as well as other benefits and help. They can also help with the application process.

The adviceline line is freephone 08082787954 Monday – Friday 9am – 4pm and they offer telephone appointments as well as face to face appointments in Chapel, Whaley Bridge, New Mills, Glossop and Buxton.



<u>Change to bin Collections during Christmas period</u>. Bins due to be collected on Thursday 26th December will be collected on **Tuesday 24th** instead. The collection on Thursday 2nd January will not be affected.

There will be no organic (green-lidded bin) collections between Monday 23rd December 2024 – Friday 5th January 2025.

Chapel en le Frith Bell Ringers



Ding-dong! Merrily on high in heaven the bells are ringing Ding-dong! Verily the sky is riven with angels singing "Gloria, hosanna in excelsis!" "Gloria, hosanna in excelsis!

The Carol, Ding Dong Merrily On High was written by a church

bell ringing enthusiast, George Ratcliffe Woodward (1848-1934), who came across the traditional melody and, through his passion for bell ringing, was inspired to give the tune a bell-inspired text.

The sound of bells is associated with Christmas, and all joyful occasions, ringing out for weddings, national celebrations, and of course, for the Sundayby-Sunday call to worship.

The bells of St Thomas Beckett have been ringing out from the tower since at least the 17thC – and there are name tablets in the tower that show generations of the same local families ringing bells across the centuries.

We have a very active band of ringers in Chapel, of all ages – if you are lucky enough to live close to the church, you'll hear us practising on a Tuesday evening and ringing every Sunday before the main service.

IF YOU SEE ANY OF THESE SIGNS PLEASE CARRY OUT THE FOLLOWING FIRST AID:

- 1. Use gardening gloves or a folded towel to gently pick the hedgehog up and pop it into a high sided cardboard or plastic box.
- 2. Bring the box indoors away from flies.
- 3. Keep the hedgehog in a quiet room away from pets and children and don't be tempted to look at it any more often than you must to carry out first aid.
- 4. Unless it's a very hot day, wrap a warm hot water bottle in a towel and place the hedgehog on it, with another towel gently draped over the hedgehog to keep the warmth in, make sure it has room to get off the bottle and that it stays warm (but not hot) at all times.
- 5. Offer a small amount of meaty cat, dog or hedgehog food and some water, don't force feed.
- 6. If it is a small hedgehog or hoglet do check nearby for others from the same litter that might also be in trouble.
- 7. Call the British Hedgehog Preservation Society on 01584 890 801 for the phone number of your local independent look online, or go direct to the rescue after contacting them
