Internal review of FOI request Subject:

Hi Sue

Just following up on this for you .... The advice I have been given is:

An internal review should be conducted if someone is unhappy with the response provided; they should ask for an internal review within 40 days of receiving the response and you have up to 40 days in which to conduct the review and issue the decision. The ICO say that a decision should be issued within 20 days, but 40 days is the maximum they recommend. Ideally the review would not be conducted by the individual who originally dealt with the request. It would be right to consult with the Clerk (if they dealt with the request) to understand why a particular decision was made or exemption(s) applied, but I don't think it would be appropriate for them to be conducting the review or corresponding on the review with the requester.

My recommendation for the Council is to firstly acknowledge receipt of the request and then to either:

- 1. Set up a committee to review the decision who will then make a recommendation to the full Council. The committee will need to familiarise themselves with the FOI rules and regulations before making their assessment and recommendation.
- 2. For the Council to resolve to employ an external agency to conduct the review on their behalf. Please note that, if this is the preferred course of action, this is not something that DALC have been asked to do by any members in the past so we would not consider ourselves to have the relevant experience. However, if the Council are finding it difficult to source a consultant to do this on their behalf, we would consider taking this on to support the council.

I hope this provides you with the clarity you need to move forward.


My property backs onto the site of where the bridge was located.

I hope you are keeping well.

Derbyshire County Council are in the process of putting together possible bids for Tranche 3 of the Active Travel Fund.

This is the largest of the Active Travel funding sources and any proposals will need to show how they contribute to both long distance cycle routes, and local active travel.

As county councillor in Whaley Bridge I'm really keen to see us able to link up routes through Whaley Bridge to the proposals from the Buxton Travel Team which rank first and second in the county council's priorities for cycling in Derbyshire.

This would involve coming through Chapel, and I understand that a proposal was submitted for the Peak Forest Tramway Trail to enable a route to be put into use again.

If it was possible to link that route to the proposals from Buxton and Whaley Bridge, it would enable us to fulfil many of the criteria for the substantial Tranche 3 funding, and as such would have a chance of securing the necessary funding for the required works.

Would you be able to give me an update on the proposals for the tramway please, and whether it may be possible to work them into a larger scheme for a proposal for Active Travel funding?

### **Dear Simon**

I am writing to ask you to help to resolve a problem that has arisen with efforts to prevent the longstanding recurrent flooding in the village of Whitehough, on the road that links Chinley to the west of Chapel-en-le-Frith.

This has been happening since the A6 Chapel bypass was completed several decades ago. With the onset of heavy rain, water flows from the south towards Black Brook which runs through the valley and pools before the road bridge over the river on Whitehough Head Road, rising rapidly to several feet within an hour of heavy rain and taking at least a day, sometimes more to subside, blocking the entrance to Chinley from the south.

Much of the water comes from the Peak Forest Tramway which runs more or less parallel to Black Brook, around 100m-200m to the south. The culvert under the ancient tramway cannot cope with the volume of water, which then flows west along the tramway and onto Whitehough Head Road, streaming down the road to flood before the bridge across it.

The large brownfield site that used to be the Dorma factory is currently being developed and Wains Homes have developed a drainage system for the site.

As a major part of the problem is the small culvert under the Peak Forest tramway which is outside of the development site. Wains have had discussions with DCC officers and developed a proposal for straightening and replacing the culvert under the tramway with a wider one. The sign-off for the designs on 10<sup>th</sup> August is attached.

The company were hoping to get the work completed before the onset of heavier rain in the winter.

I have come to this as the new County Councillor and understand that it was always expected that DCC would make a contribution to these works as they are the responsibility of the County Council and they will also hopefully solve a very long-running and serious flood issue.

The developer has asked for a contribution of £10,000 to the cost of the works, which as you can see from the attached plans will be substantial, involving removing and replacing a section of the tramway, inserting a wider culvert over around a 20 foot section that falls outside of the development site, and connecting it to the new drainage system on the estate.

At this point I understand that officers have said that they cannot agree to any contribution for the work to go ahead without a S278 agreement for which fees would be incurred. The need for a S278 agreement has not previously been mentioned when the works were approved, which is now frustrating for the developer who is keen to get on with the work, and for the community who have suffered for too long from the flooding.

Wains have requested that if a contribution cannot be made by DCC, then the County Council do the agreed works themselves before winter, but this has been refused. Officers have stated that the culvert under the tramway will simply be cleared and will not be enlarged.

I and many other local people will attest to the fact that this is a longstanding problem which will not be solved by clearing the culvert as it is too small for the volume of water and even when it is clear then large volumes flow onto the tramway and then down the road.

The sum requested does not seem a huge amount in relation to the work required, which DCC will need to undertake themselves eventually, along with further clearance of the existing culvert in the meantime, but unless this work is done now the local communities of Chapel-en-le-Frith, Chinley and especially Whitehough will suffer from further flooding over the coming winter.

The £10,000 proposed seems like a relatively small sum in return for a major gain for the county council and local communities.

I understand that individual officers may not be able to sign off on a financial contribution, but I hope that you and more senior officers will be able to look at this proposal and seek to reach a practical solution, whether by DCC undertaking the work required, or by making a contribution.

If I am able to do so under the rules of the scheme, I would be happy to make some contribution from my Councillors' Initiative Fund as alleviation of the flooding would have a considerable community benefit for the area for many years to come, including the scouts and guides whose hut is adjacent to the bridge and is regularly flooded.

I hope that a speedy resolution can be found to enable the work to be completed this autumn. I would be pleased to discuss this with you, or to seek the answers to any questions that you or officers may have.







